Why Handel Waggled his Wig - and lots more stories about the lives of Great Composers by Steven Isserlis.

I have always admired Isserlis the cellist, but until I read Why Handel Waggled his Wig had failed to realise that his prowess with the bow is matched by that with a pen!

Why Handel Waggled his Wig is a second volume about the lives of the great composers, the first being Why Beethoven Threw the Stew. In this book, Isserlis describes, in addition to Handel, Haydn, Schubert, Tchaikovsky, Dvorãk and Fauré. Each has a chapter packed with anecdote, biographical and musical detail, and particular vignettes in their life and career.

Isserlis writes entertainingly at all times, and achieves that rare feat, in a book about classical music, of making the reader laugh out loud. This is a great book for children, either to be read to, or to read themselves, and could well arouse a longer term interest in classical music in their little hearts; but it is also a perfect introduction for adults who may be daunted by the field, or ashamed of their ignorance, and want a way in that doesn't patronise them.

I eagerly await volume three.
